
Two very important things are happening this fall for the whole Church: the Synod on the Family is taking place in Rome and we will soon begin the Year of Mercy proclaimed by Pope Francis.

It is no accident that these two events come together. From the outset of his papacy the Holy Father has been drawing our attention to the need we all have to proclaim the Good News by opening doors and helping one another to live the Christian life, to discover and thrive in our vocations and to give glory to God by what we do as much as we do in our prayer and worship.

Pope St. John Paul II gave us the foundations on which to build. The Catechism, the vision for the third millennium of Christianity, the Gospel of Life, Theology of the Body, development of the social teachings of the Church, and his description of the human person all based on Christ, have given to the Church the ingredients for the maturity necessary to evangelize.

Like St. Paul, Pope Francis, has reminded us to avoid immaturity, to think that we are somehow experts, better than those who may not be regularly in church, or that we can evangelize without somehow becoming vulnerable ourselves. Indeed, to help others, we too must “give up” something. We must be willing for it to have a cost and give it freely, that is, not be attached to whether it will be fruitful in our lifetime.

Much of mercy and the healing of families comes through simple things that we often neglect. The first is listening. Truly listening to another is not always easy. I'd like to think that listening is always a kind of prayer. It represents our desire for the good of the other and this we can always pass on to the Lord. In listening, I may have to carry something of the other's burden. This is a deep part of themselves, part of the tabernacle where the Lord Most High dwells. Mercy is there in that Holy of Holies.



Similarly, it is the silence of Jesus before Pilate that speaks volumes. There is no response to the violence of people’s hearts other than the compassion which can only be found in some kind of stillness where we become open to God. The “answer” is to be found in Christ. He lays down His life carrying with Him the brokenness of the human heart so that we might be reborn with Him, His creation be made new.

Can we drink a little of this cup? It is the question of the day for the apostles and it is for us. If we have sufferings of our own, can we, with gentleness, trust them to Jesus and with similar gentleness guide others to do so? Jesus asks us to trust. His word is firm but quiet. “Your faith has saved you.”

Thank you also was expressed to outgoing regional chairs Ann D'Souza and Suzanne Cockburn for taking on their new roles as President-Elect / Organization Chair and Christian Family Life Chair respectively. You will note the names and addresses of the remaining newly-elected diocesan CWL executive officers and their standing committee chair positions on the inside front cover of this newsletter. A warm welcome back to Debbie Bates who is returning as our new Education and Health Standing Committee Chair. Also special salutations to our four new Regional

Chairs: Kate O'Quinn, Franca (Francesca) Bunnell, Melanie Nazareth and Philomena Menezes.

Welcome also to our Newsletter co-editors Karen Nazione-Garcea and Christine Abela who have collaborated with Tracy, Alice and Pat Cross to produce this informative fall issue.

A final highlight of our 94th Toronto Diocesan Convention was the presentation of a Life Membership pin to our long standing executive member Mary Hawkey! Congratulations Mary!

I hope that everyone who attended this year came away rejuvenated and inspired to action. The ongoing contributions of all of you committed women are very reassuring to me as your new president and are indispensable to the League.

The Ontario Provincial Convention held in Niagara Falls this year, had over 400 registered including over 40 from the Toronto diocese. The keynote speaker on the first day was Dr. Josephine Lombardi who spoke to the national CWL theme '*One Heart One Voice One Mission*'. She showed us how it commissions CWL members to use **ONE HEART** filled with the love for God, others and self to speak with **ONE VOICE** inspired by the gospel to encourage **ONE MISSION** of encountering Jesus in everything we do. In the afternoon, Dr Moira McQueen, Executive Director of the Canadian Catholic Bioethics Institute and recently appointed member of the International Theological Commission of Rome spoke about *Palliative Care*. She stressed the importance of supporting models of Palliative care that do not entertain any form of Euthanasia or Physician Assisted Death and encouraged directing letters & postcards to government officials asking for the notwithstanding clause /more time.

Our two resolutions passed at our Toronto Diocesan Convention, were presented to those assembled at the Provincial Convention. With a few minor amendments, both were passed and forwarded to the National Resolutions Standing Committee Chair for consideration. Congratulations to all who worked so hard to make that process work so efficiently.

At our fall regional meetings you will hear about the August National Convention chaired by Barbara Dowding and held this year in Vancouver, British Columbia.

As we head into the fall and a federal election, I am both encouraged and challenged by the words of Pope Francis: *“Politics, according to the Social Doctrine of the Church, is one of the highest forms of charity, because it serves the common good.... We all have to give something! ... A good Catholic meddles in politics, offering the best of himself so that those who govern can govern. But what is the best that we can offer to those who govern? **Prayer!**”* (Pope Francis, Sept 16/13). I know without a doubt that the prayers offered by our sisters in the League and friends in faith will assist the Toronto Diocesan Council (TDC) to guide it’s members towards action for both ‘*The Sanctity And Dignity Of Human Life*’. The challenge ahead is to discern cooperatively and collaboratively with likeminded faith-filled individuals and organizations what priorities will guide our TDC Catholic Women’s League service for God and Canada. I urge all those in League leadership to heed the advice of Pope Francis to approach their service with love and humility. Let us work together as our national theme suggests finding ‘*One Heart, One Voice, One Mission (as) ...One Family in Christ*’ in our attempts to address the issues facing our secular society.

Towards this end we ask each Toronto Diocesan Regional executive to work collaboratively with our committee chairs, their local council presidents, spiritual advisors, parish ministries and with Catholic organizations to host Panel Forums in the four main areas around the archdiocese. The intent of these forums is to inform all parishioners about ‘*Urgent Matters Affecting End of Life*’. Guest speakers are available through the Canadian Catholic Bioethics Institute and The Euthanasia Prevention Coalition. Committee and Regional Chairs will receive more detailed action plans after the September TDC executive meeting and updates will also be posted on our website at www.cwltoronto.ca so stay tuned!

Rosary Sunday

Outdoor confessions will be held prior to the Mass. The Procession of the Blessed Sacrament with the Living Rosary and Benediction will take place at the Papal Altar at 2:30 pm. The homilist will be Most Rev. Wayne Kirkpatrick, Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Toronto.

Action:

- Councils are encouraged to bring their banners for the procession and to invite parishioners and family to attend. Also, each member is encouraged bring her own rosary, lawn chair or blanket.

October - Month of the Rosary

The month of **October** is dedicated the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary and is celebrated on October 7. Some suggestions for councils to celebrate the Holy Rosary include:

- dedicate their October meeting to the Rosary. Say a decade of the Rosary, explain the format of Rosary, invite the Rosary Apostolate, Legion of Mary, etc.
- encourage members to pray the Rosary every day
- attend Mass on October 7, the feast of Our Lady of the Holy Rosary and on October 13, the day of the final apparition at Fatima.

Fellowship of the Least Coin

This program is sponsored by the Women's Inter-Church Council of Canada, an ecumenical movement of Christian women to pray together and live a reconciling and forgiving life with others. This year's service will be held on Saturday, October 31, 2015, at 1:00 pm at the Leaside Presbyterian Church, 674 Eglinton Avenue East in Toronto.

Reporting Deceased Members

It is imperative to track the names of deceased members in your council to ensure accurate records for the Book of Life at all levels of the League. Some of the councils that are set up on the Online Administration for Membership are not using it to report their deceased members. Deceased members should be reported on the online system, which will eliminate the need to fill out the paper form for Reporting Deceased Members that is sent to National Office. The National, Provincial and the Toronto Diocesan councils receive an automatic notification once the information is submitted online.

Action: The council online administrator or Spiritual Development Chair, if still using the paper form, need to ensure that deceased members are reported immediately following their death.

Recognizing Deceased Former CWL Members

National still accepts death notification for former members even if their dues have not been paid for a number of years. Situations may arise in which the deceased former member did not pay her membership fees due to failing health, residing in a nursing home, etc. Whatever the reason, councils are to respect that the member supported the League in the past, so an honour guard, vigil prayers and recognition in the Book of Life are still appropriate. Deceased former members are only active in the online system for two years after their last payment.

Action: A council member should contact the family to offer assistance and explain how the council could be involved in honoring the deceased member. The Council Online Administrator should send an email to notify National of the deceased former member or the Spiritual Development Chair can send the paper form for councils that are still using the mail-in form

Congratulations and blessings to all the Organization Chairs in the Toronto Diocese: *“Every new beginning comes from some other beginning’s end”*. I am deeply humbled and honored for the opportunity to serve as the Organization Chair, as I journey along these two years with Anne Madden (newly elected at the Provincial level as Organization Chair) and will need your help and support to fulfill my duties.



Membership

A look at our National membership record dated June 31st, shows a decrease of 505 members; this is an alarming number. I have asked Regional Chairs to take a closer look at their councils and to check on the delays in membership payment and to help close the gap. A total of 49 members paid their 2014 membership fee in 2015. Are you paying your

memberships on line? If not, we can help your council out, please reach out to Lucia Vacca or to me.

We need our membership to grow so that our voice is stronger when the National Council meets with government representatives, bringing our resolutions and concerns to them. When they quote the number of members in the League they know our “one voice and one mission” should be taken seriously as our “one heart” holds the power to sway the votes. I know that you are all capable of a great deal, if each council would make it’s goal to increase two to four members each year, we can easily make up the lost numbers and have an increase too. Look at your neighbouring parishes; if they do not have a CWL, work on it to break ground to start one, also start conversations with friends and family to join the League. I am here to help you reach your potential to increase your membership, so I’m relying on each of you to prove me right!

At the provincial convention opening ceremony Mass in Niagara, I was in awe listening to Marcel Lemmen, State Advocate to the Ontario State Office Knights of Columbus, who asked that both CWL and K of C work together, leverage each other in increasing membership and to work in partnership. Our National President Barbara Dowding said, *“Marcel, let my people talk to your people”*. Let’s use this approach and partner with the K of C. You can also gift a CWL membership to the ladies in your family or to friends who are not CWL members, and share your stories on the great work you do in your council.

Besides acquiring new members, we have to retain the members we have; do not forget them once they register. Annually reward the members for their hard work and commitments; have a ceremony for the service awards. Margaret Ann Jacobs, National Chair of Organization mentioned in her March communication: *“wouldn’t it be wonderful to urge parish councils to pay the fees for members who belong to religious orders? What a delightful way to recognize them!”* Think creatively! Margaret Ann also mentioned that at the national executive meeting, a decision was made to increase the number of presentation pins. Service pins will be available (including 10 years) from 20 years of service in five-year increments up to 75 years.

Annual Reports

The annual report package will be delivered to the council presidents through the Regional Chair in September, please fill them up **ASAP** and return them back to me no later than **November 15, 2015**, so that the Diocesan executive can prepare their reports and share the good work

that you do in your respective councils. Fill up each report; if a council does not have a convener, the president should file that report.


Member Development

PAST PRESIDENT/ HISTORIAN

Greetings to all my fellow historians! As a new past president, I'm delighted to take on this position and I look forward to working with all of you as we offer encouragement, support and enthusiasm to all our executive and council members.



Like any new undertaking in the CWL, it requires some research and consulting with your predecessors. I have found that many jobs and activities fall under this position. For easy reference of the duties of the past president, you can find them listed in the *Executive Handbook* on pages 23 and 24. In brief, they are as follows:

- 1) Serve the council and president in a consultative capacity. (Attend meetings, be supportive, be diplomatic, seek out and encourage members to participate in the League.)
- 2) Be responsible for the archives and history of the council. (Write a summary of your term as president, store all records in a safe place, update all council historical information and complete a record of all events. This record can be in the form of a scrapbook, photo album, etc., be creative!)
- 3) Facilitate the study and implementation of the Constitution & Bylaws. (Read a few Bylaws at each meeting to bring about discussion and a better understanding of our Constitution. Be sure to make yourself aware of any changes to our Constitution.

Most of all, remember that while as past president you should always be available to your council and your president, we must also be very careful not to assume the authority that rightly belongs to the president. You may advise and assist the president using your experience and expertise, but also be prepared to let go and allow your council and president the space they need to achieve their goals.

Mentoring Award

When we speak about mentoring in the CWL, we think of individuals who, through their gifts of love and compassion, have helped others to fulfill and use their gifts and talents in their work as CWL members.

At the Diocesan Convention in May, we presented the awards this year for the Patricia Beattie Annual Memorial Mentoring Award. This year for the first time, we had two recipients for the Parish Level; they were Donna Shaddick from St. Leo the Great Parish in Brooklin, Durham Region, and Julia Nixon from Nativity of Our Lord Parish in Etobicoke, Humber Valley Region. Both of these ladies are long-time members of the League and have held various positions on their parish council executives. They continue to support, guide and mentor members to achieve their personal bests and both ladies are very well deserving of this award.

Carole Pitcher, Life Member and Past Toronto Diocesan President, received the award for service to the Diocesan Council and Auxiliary Levels of the League. Carole joined the League in 1969 at St. John Fisher Council in Bramalea, where she still remains a member today. Over the years, Carole has held various positions at the different levels of the League and served as Toronto Diocesan President from 2007-2009. She received her Life Member's Pin in 2011. If you are close to the end of your term as past president, then your council should be holding an election soon. You can prepare yourself by first reviewing the reference document *Parish Elections - Key Points* available on our website by accessing www.cwltoronto.ca> Resources> Reference Documents. You can also refer to the *National Manual of Policy and Procedure*, which outlines the proper procedures. If you need any

clarification or help, please contact me and I'll be happy to assist. (Please see the front cover of this newsletter for my contact information.)

May the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit guide you as past president to be the best that you can be for your councils.

COMMUNITY LIFE

Welcome back everyone from your summer break. I want to extend my thanks for your vote of confidence at our convention and am looking forward to serving as your Community Life Standing Committee Chair for the next two years. With your prayers, I hope that I will be able to bring you information that you can share with your members and perhaps develop a plan of action in your communities “at home and abroad”.



I have spent part of my summer trying to get a good grasp of what my duties are as Community Life Standing Committee Chair, by reading up on past Community Life directives, communiques, and annual reports from all levels – national, provincial and diocesan, and also works of my predecessors.

Community Life Committee has five sub-topics, and as a Parish Council, you may find one or two or all of the topics of some interest to your members. Let me break the sub-topics down in a simplified check list format, and I hope that it will also assist you when completing your Parish Council Community Life annual report – oh yes, it's almost that time of the year again. I've adapted this check list from one of the directives written by Mary Jane Yaeger (past Provincial Community Life Chair).

Support of dignity and rights of persons:

- support and assist charitable causes; eg., children's or youth's drop-in centers, blood donor clinics, meals on wheels, women's support groups/shelters, clothing drives, addiction centers, mental health centers, school lunch and breakfast programs, addressing families in crisis, etc.
- serve on boards of charitable organizations; eg., St. Vincent de Paul, Vita Centre, Rose of Sharon, Rose of Durham, etc.
- focus on trafficking in women and children through workshops, education/awareness programs, speakers, etc.
- educate members and sponsor programs dealing with the effects of bullying.
- volunteer in personal care homes, seniors' homes, and/or conduct programs focusing on the rights of seniors and elder abuse.
- support and/or educate on poverty or issues affecting Indigenous people; e.g., Resolution ON.14.02 Feathers of Hope – Empowering First Nations Youth.
- study Legislation and Resolutions relating to dignity and rights of persons, and follow action plans with letter writing, etc.

Actions related to social and economic justice:

- support food banks, soup kitchens, community and school breakfast programs.
- volunteer with organizations that support the blind, patients with Alzheimer's.
- invite speakers on home safety for seniors.
- write letters to all levels of government in support of Resolutions.

- lobby government, through personal contact and letter-writing, to improve living conditions for the poor and homeless, etc.

Efforts to support **refugees, immigration and citizenship:**

- assist members with immigration, refugee or citizenship issues, such as completing forms, contacting various government agencies, etc.
- welcome new immigrants into the community with receptions, helping to celebrate citizenship ceremonies, arrange transportation to attend Mass, invite them to participate in parish activities, etc.
- billet foreign students.

Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace

- serve on boards and committees of CCODP.
- promote individual and council participation in raising funds for the national voluntary fund; i.e., encourage members to contribute 1% of personal expenditures to CCODP and encourage the council to contribute 1% of its revenues to CCODP.
- promote the use of CCODP Share Lent resources in the parish.

Assist those in **developing countries:**

- support agencies such as Canadian Food for Children, Save the Children, Foster Parents, Habitat for Humanity, Child Care International, Chalice, Doctors Without Borders, etc.
- provide assistance to victims of storms, earthquakes, etc.
- invite speakers on issues such as water shortage in West Africa, deaths caused by water-borne illness and disease, etc.
- support the Buy-a-net program to eradicate malaria in Africa.

Health:

In July 2015, at the CWL Ontario Provincial Convention in Niagara Falls, five resolutions were adopted. Two of those resolutions fall under Education and Health

ON.15.01: Ban the use of plastic microbeads in personal care products

ON.15.02: Banning the use of Neonicotinoid Pesticides

A third resolution, **ON.15.04:** Provision of Regulated Housing for the Chronic, Severely Mentally Ill, falls under both Education Health and Community Life.

While it is important that new resolutions are submitted each year for consideration, it is equally, if not more important, that members carry out the action plans that are developed for each adopted resolution. I encourage you to visit the CWL Ontario Provincial website at

<http://www.cwl.on.ca/resolutions> and read these resolutions and their briefs.

Share the information with your members and see if there is any interest to study any of these resolutions and act on the corresponding Action Plan.

ON.15.01 Ban the use of plastic microbeads in personal care products

Action Plan:

- Write letters to the manufacturers of products containing microbeads urging them to discontinue their use and switch to biodegradable abrasives.
- Become knowledgeable about the effect of plastic microbeads and how they can contaminate water.
- Beware of products using plastic microbeads and avoid buying products that contain the words polyethylene (PE), polypropylene (PP), polyethylene terephthalate (PET), or polymethacrylate (PMMA) in their ingredients.
- Choose products that do not contain plastic and choose products that use natural exfoliates, such as walnut shells, almonds, grape seeds, sugar, oatmeal and sea salt.

- Invite a speaker from your community dealing with health and/or environmental issues concerning plastic microbeads in Ontario rivers, streams and the Great Lakes.
- Write letters to Provincial ministers of health and environment, urging protection of Ontario's water, as well as to enact legislation to ensure that plastic microbeads are removed from personal care products by the manufacturer.
- Write letters to the Ontario Dental Association and Ontario Medical Association to learn their stance on the use of microbeads.

ON.15.02 Banning the use of Neonicotinoid Pesticides

Action Plan:

- Purchase organic plant seedlings or grow plants from untreated seeds in organic potting soil for home gardens.
- Advise the local nursery managers that you will only purchase plants free of neonicotinoids and ask the managers to communicate your request to their suppliers.
- Avoid the use of systemic bee-toxic pesticides in your garden. These products may contain acetamiprid, clothianidin, imidacloprid, thiamethoxam, thiacloprid and dinotefuran as active ingredients. Use insecticidal soaps or oils and other eco-friendly pest control methods.
- If you have these products at home, dispose of them as municipal hazardous waste or take them back to the store where you bought them.
- Provide habitat for pollinators by planting pollinator-friendly trees and flowers.
- Contact local members of parliament and provincial parliament requesting a ban on the widespread use of these pesticides.

ON.15.04 Provision of Regulated Housing for the Chronic, Severely Mentally Ill

Action Plan:

- Develop a postcard campaign to lobby all levels of government for safe, affordable, regulated, geared-to-needs housing.
- Write letters to appropriate levels of government to advocate for needed housing.
- Encourage members to become aware of the housing needs in their community and develop or join with other local efforts to find ways to help.
- Support members living with mental illness within our own community by being welcoming and compassionate.

LEGISLATION

Welcome back after the summer break and welcome to new Legislation Chairs. I'm pleased that we'll be journeying this interesting standing committee together. We also welcome Carole Richer as new Provincial Legislation Chair.



We are in the midst of one of the longest federal election campaigns in recent history (78 days). Prime Minister Stephen Harper visited the Governor General on August 2nd to ask him to dissolve Parliament for the October 19th election. This is our opportunity to choose who we think should represent us in our ridings and who should be Prime Minister.

2015 Federal Election

Elections Canada has made some changes for this election. Voters are now required to prove their identity with photo ID – one piece if it's government issued; i.e., driver's license, or provincial ID – two pieces, if not. A new Elections Canada initiative will allow voters to register online. It is hoped this will speed up the process at local polling stations and improve the quality of the voters list in advance. More information can be found on the Elections Canada website www.electionscanada.ca.

So how do we sort through all the information to determine who we think will best represent us? As always, we want to pay attention to issues that are important to us as Catholics. Here are some websites you can check: the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB) ccc.ca, the Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace www.dev.org and the Catholic Register, both print and online www.catholicregister.org.

Provincial Legislation

On June 2, the Ontario Legislature passed Bill 31, also known as the "Making Ontario's Roads Safer Act". The new legislation received unanimous support from all three political parties, a feat that is not easily obtained in the Legislature. The bill is broken into three parts: Distracted Driving, Cycling and Slow Down, Move Over.

Distracted Driving: Recognizing that distracted driving is a significant and growing issue on our roads, the bill allows for an increase in fines. Currently, the fine is set at \$280, and it will increase to between \$300 to

\$1,000 per infraction. Along with the increased fine, three demerit points will be applied upon a distracted driving conviction.

Cycling: The Making Ontario’s Roads Safer Act helps enable a shared road environment and promotes greater safety for our road users. The fine range for convictions of ‘dooring’ cyclists has increased to between \$300 and \$1,000 and the loss of three demerit points.

Slow Down, Move Over: Requirements have now been extended to tow truck operators that are providing service on the side of the road. The legislation expands the current Slow Down, Move Over requirements found in the Highway Traffic Act. Tow trucks stopped on the shoulder of the highway, and providing service with their amber lights activated will be included in legislation. Motorists must slow down and move over to the next lane, similar to the provision given to police, ambulance and fire services.

One other important area of the bill is drug-impaired driving. For the first time, the provincial government has introduced rules for drug-impaired driving. These rules mirror those already in place for alcohol-impaired driving, including a license suspension of up to 90 days, and a seven-day vehicle impoundment.

Truth and Reconciliation Report

In June, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) released its report exposing the horrors that transpired at Canada’s residential schools. After meeting with aboriginal leaders in Newfoundland in mid-July, the provincial leaders vowed to implement the 94 recommendations made by the TRC in their respective provinces and territories. Justice Sinclair’s commission urged reforms on education, health care, child welfare and justice issues to improve the lives of First Nations peoples.

TDC2015.02 Reinstatement of the Mandatory Long Form Census

Thank you also to Loretta Bennett, Rosemary Keenan and the members of St. Mary's Council, Brampton, Peel Region, for their gift of Resolution TDC2015.02. Their time, energy and talents in preparing these two resolutions are appreciated by the Toronto Diocesan Council and all its members. Also, a huge measure of gratitude and appreciation goes to former Diocesan Resolutions Chair, Hilarion Mitchell for guiding these two councils through the process. Her attention to the details of the guidelines as well as her enthusiasm, helped ensure the success of these two resolutions, which were presented to the provincial convention in July.

The resolutions passed at the Ontario Provincial convention held in Niagara Falls in July are as follows:

ON.15.01 Ban the use of plastic micro beads in personal care products
(Hamilton Diocese)

ON.15.02 Banning the use of Neonicotinoid Pesticides (Hamilton Diocese)

ON.15.03 Mandatory Police Vulnerable Sector Checks for the Supervision of Minors (Toronto Diocese)

ON.15.04 Provision of Regulated Housing for the Chronic, Severely Mentally Ill (London Diocese)

ON.15.05 Reinstatement of the Mandatory Long-Form Census (Toronto Diocese)

These five resolutions were forwarded to the national council for consideration to be presented to the national convention to be held in August. Copies of these resolutions and their action plans can be found on the provincial CWL website at <http://www.cwl.on.ca/resolutions>.

As Resolutions Standing Committee Chairs, it is our responsibility to keep our members informed of resolutions at all levels and to put them into action. Educate yourself about the topics and issues (get a speaker, read articles or share the resolutions brief at a meeting). Follow the suggestions of the action plan.

If you do not have a parish resolutions or legislation chair, these resolutions should be studied by the appropriate committee chair as indicated in the right hand corner of the resolution (for example ON.15.01 would be studied under the Education and Health Committee Chair). In this way, all resolutions will receive the appropriate level of study and action by CWL members. Resolutions and their action plans are one way we can show we are women of faith.

This year, let's make the commitment to choose and follow through on the action plan of an existing resolution, and if appropriate, involve other councils, your parish family and/or your community. Think about how these issues affect your community, province and country. Choose to make a difference.

Deadline for Submission of Topics

The deadline for the submission of topics for resolutions for the 2016 Diocesan Convention is Oct. 31, 2015. If your council is considering a resolution, a first draft with some basic research on the subject needs to be submitted by that date. Go to the Toronto Diocesan website, www.cwltoronto.ca, and under the Resources-resolutions tab you will find all the pertinent information on how to get started.

2015 Resolutions Annual Reports

The 2015 Resolutions Annual Report forms will be handed out during the Fall Regional Meetings and will be posted on the diocesan website. Councils are asked to submit a fully completed report even if there is no Resolutions Chair. If your council has been checking off accomplishments and actions as they occurred, then the report will be quickly filled. In the absence of a Resolutions Chair, assign another executive or general member to complete the Resolutions annual report.
