
## 5<sup>th</sup> Moira Ste. Marie Memorial Lecture

November is devoted to the souls in purgatory.

Take a look at your bulletin's Mass list. Most churches put names next to the Mass.

Those people are in need of prayers and most of the time parishes pray for people who have passed on. Whereas canonized saints we know are in Heaven, we make sure to do all we can for others who have passed, especially those in most need, by praying that they, too, are in Heaven. November is



also a time that re-ignites the sense of grief and loss that many of us may feel. If you have a copy of The Living With Christ Sunday Missal (Novalis), I encourage you to read pages 593-596. It presents ways to "adapt the biblical prayers of lament within your family as a way to express the grief, disappointment, heartache or hopelessness" that we may experience. The five ways are:

- Invoking God's presence
- Naming the grief, loss or disappointment we are suffering
- Expressing confidence or trust in God's responsive love
- Requesting explicit help for our troubles
- Praising God for bringing us through our lament

Peel Regional and Scarborough Regional Chairs have confirmed that they will be holding a prayer service in November for deceased members. Contact them for more information.
