Development Day



Coldest Night of the Year

The Coldest Night of the Year (CNOY) is a winterrific family-friendly 2 or 5 km fundraising walk in support of local charities serving people experiencing hurt, hunger, and homelessness. Each year in February, tens of thousands of Canadians step outside the warmth and comfort of home to shine a light of welcome and compassion in their communities. Since 2011, the Coldest Night of the Year has raised over **\$75,000,000** across Canada in 190 Canadian communities – 100% of net proceeds stay local to support CNOY charity partners.

Three CWL councils reported participating.



St. Francis Xavier CWL Council (Peel) the 2km walkparticipated in proving a triumphant debut, showcasing engagement, and fundraising prowess. Dedicated to supporting Armagh, aiding victims of domestic abuse, the event united diverse participants, raising \$43,000+ for Armagh, with St. Francis Xavier **CWL** contributing \$1,150. Notable

achievements include an impactful awareness campaign and valuable networking opportunities. Challenges like weather resilience and fundraising were overcome. Future recommendations emphasize year-round engagement, collaborative initiatives, education programs, and diversified fundraising. The event epitomizes CWL's commitment to the Service pillar, inspiring ongoing support for Armagh and domestic abuse combat. On Saturday, February 24th, **St. Joseph CWL** (Peel) participated in numerous activities, living the objects of the League- Faith & Service.

The day began with members attending the Stations of the Cross walking along the perimeter of the church. The Stations of the Cross was installed by the CWL 2 years ago to commemorate our 65th anniversary. Following which Members prepared and served Meals at our Open Door Project. Attendees called it a "Feast". The members did not stop there! This



was followed by members attending and completing the 2K and 5 K walk as part of the Coldest Night of the Year challenge. We helped to make a difference in our community by raising \$4,786.00 for Armagh House, a second-stage, longer-term housing for abused women and their children who are fleeing the devastating effects of domestic violence. Armagh House reached 85% of their total goal, raising \$42,773 and counting. It is fundraising like this that helps provide hope and shelter for those in need. As the sun set, members ended the day by serving food at the Tent encampment outside the PEEL family Shelter. We at the Council are blessed with Members who always rise to the Call of action. A Big shout out to our outreach Team and Membership at St. Joseph Streetsville.

Ten members from St. John Chrysostom Parish CWL **Council** (North York) wore their CWL sashes and participated to raise \$3264 for the local shelter, Inn From the Cold. A bake sale was held the week before the event to add to the total raised by pledges from the parish community. One of the members also

helped out at the event kitchen to prepare the after walk chili. The citizens of Newmarket raised more than \$172,000 locally, far surpassing the target of \$90,000.



In Closing

As we continue our journey "up to Jerusalem" during the month of March, three prominent ideas are proposed for our contemplation by the liturgy of Lent: the Passion and Resurrection of Christ, baptism, and penance.

The entire month of March except the very last day falls during the liturgical season of Lent which is represented by the liturgical color violet or purple — a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart.

Here and there in the stark March landscape, a few plants and trees are beginning to give evidence of the new life that winter's frost and chill had concealed from our eyes. Snowdrops in my garden have showed their bloom and tulips are starting to pop through the earth. The Church's vibrant new life has been obscured, too, by the austerity of the penitential season of Lent. But that life is indisputable, and it will burgeon forth on Easter as Christ coming forth from his tomb!

"We do not pretend that life is all beauty. We are aware of darkness and sin, of poverty and pain. But we know Jesus has conquered sin and passed through his own pain to the glory of the Resurrection. And we live in the light of his Paschal Mystery – the mystery of his Death and Resurrection. 'We are an Easter People and Alleluia is our song!" (St. John Paul II, Australia 1986)

May our Alleluias resound loud and clear.
